Local History

Wendell park began life as an outer London area of market gardens and brickfields. It's park had a reputation as an oasis of calm in the city providing recreation, rest and relaxation for the people of the suburb as well as many visitors from nearby Chiswick.

St Saviour Wendell Park was built in 1894 for £5,800 and its attached iron mission hut was in use in since 1886 by Rev. Alfred Long of Christ's Church Lancaster Gate serving the unemployed with hot soup, clothes and tea that was provided by the residents of his parish in Lancaster Gate.
